MEETING SUMMARY:

1900 hrs Mr. J. Greg Jolissaint, Chair, Howard County Commission for Veterans and Military Families (HCCVMF), presiding, opened the meeting.

1. Establishment of Quorum and Recognition of Special Guests

- a. The Role was taken: Ten Commission members being in attendance, Mr. Jolissaint declared the Commission was in quorum and brought the meeting to order.



- b. Mr. Jolissaint recognized the attendance of key Commission personnel and special guests: Ms. Lisa Terry, Manager, HCOVMF, Mr. Ed A. Hall, Chair, JMC, Ms. Rohini Gupta, HCLS, Ms. Melissa Barber, Program Manager, ServingTogether, and Ms. Mallary Lass, Outreach Manager, Steven A. Cohen Military Clinic at Easterseals.

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2. Consideration of the May 2020 Meeting Minutes

- a. Mr. Jolissaint entered the 07 MAY 2020 Commission minutes onto the table and opened the table for discussion. Hearing none, the minutes were approved by unanimous consent. Mr. Jolissaint directed that the minutes be entered into the official record and it was so done.

3. Presentation by Invited Guests

- a. Ms. Melissa Barber (Program Manager, ServingTogether)²: ServingTogether's primary office is in Montgomery County, but they operate throughout the D.C. metropolitan area. Their mission is to connect veterans, active-duty military, their families, and caregivers to services that they need: employment, housing, financial assistance, and behavioral health.

One thing that makes them different from other organizations is that they have a network of providers that they can refer clients to directly. They work with the provider and client to streamline services and determine if the provider can meet the client's needs before the client spends time filling out paperwork. This saves the client time and reduces their frustration searching for someone who can help them. Organizations can register as a network provider, and anyone can go to their website and fill out a network assistance form to get connected to a provider.

Mr. Jolissaint noted that there are several veteran-orientated organizations that participate in the ServingTogether network and that, recently, Kaiser Permanente has joined the network.

- b. Ms. Mallary Lass (Outreach Manager, Steven A. Cohen Military Clinic at Easterseals)³: The Clinic is located in Silver Spring, MD. They offer mental health counseling to veterans regardless of when, where, or how long they served. They provide counseling to individuals ages four and up, couple's counseling, and family counseling. Couples and family counseling are offered to anyone in the veteran's life: e.g., caregiver, unmarried spouse, adult children, etc. Furthermore, counseling can be for anything connected to the veteran's life and is not limited to the person's military experiences. Counseling does not require a referral. Services are offered to anyone in D.C., Virginia, and Maryland via telehealth and via in-person clinic.



They also offer childcare at no cost and wellness programs such as yoga, art, and a Shakespeare group, etc.

Ms. Terry asked if their office in Silver Spring is located near a Metro line. Ms. Mallary said that they are located near the Silver Spring Metro station and a bus stop.

Mr. Jolissaint noted that the Clinic is co-located with the Northern Virginia - D.C. - Maryland Easterseals in Silver Springs, MD. The care clinic is also part of the ServingTogether provider network.

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- c. Ms. Roh-ni Gupta (Howard County Library System)⁴: Ms. Gupta stated that the library will be hosting a meet-n-greet with two New York Times best-selling authors, Mr. Elliott Ackerman and Mr. Phil Klay, starting at 1900 hours on 9 June.

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Mr. Ackerman is widely acclaimed for his book, "Red Dress in Black and White." He is a National Book Award finalist who also wrote "Dark at the Crossing," "Green on Blue," and the non-fiction book, "Places and Names." He is a former White House Fellow and USMC veteran who was awarded the Silver Star, Bronze Star for Valor, and the Purple Heart.

Mr. Klay is the author of soon-to-be-released, "Missionaries." He is a USMC veteran and teaches Masters of Fine Arts (MFA) in Creative Writing at Fairfield University. His 2014 short story collection, "Redeployment," received the National Book Award for fiction.

4. Old Business

- a. Feedback on VAMHCS: Mr. Bolen summarized the Veterans Affairs Maryland Health Care System (VAMHCS) meeting held on 20 May 2020.

The VAMHCS VSO & CS meeting is held on the third Wednesday of the month at the VAMHCS facility in Baltimore. The next meeting is on 17 June. Currently, all meetings are virtual. - b. Update on Committee to Investigate the Feasibility of Building a Veterans Home in Howard County: Mr. Blum stated that he plans to schedule an appointment with the Howard County Executive to discuss a veteran's home when concerns about the pandemic begin to relax.



- c. Update on the Howard County Veterans Foundation Monument Design: Ms. Terry stated that the "Bailey" park construction had been completed and looks great. No further updates.

- d. Update on Veterans Support Group: Mr. Jolissaint stated that the support group was going to need NAMI training but that it doesn't appear that NAMI is going to offer virtual training during the pandemic.

Mr. Rivers stated that he talked to NAMI, and they believe in face-to-face training so they have not yet created a "virtual" training course.

Mr. Jolissaint stated that the rest of the healthcare community was adapting to the new "environment" and are starting to offer tele-healthcare services.

Ms. Terry stated that Maryland's Commitment to Veterans may offer a veteran's support group training that she will investigate.

- e. Update on Veterans Day Presentations in HoCo Schools: Mr. Jolissaint stated that the Commission will need to work with the school system to find out what can be offered for the Fall semester.

- f. Update on the Mental Health Support for Veterans Webinar with the Local Health Improvement Coalition (LHIC) and the HCCVMF: Ms. Kesler stated the webinar had representation from the HCCVMF, HCOVMF, Howard County Local Children's Board, Howard County Health Department, The VA Way, Parent Rescue, Maryland Commitment to Veterans, and the Steven A. Cohen Military Clinic. Ms. Kesler stated that Mr. Jolissaint, Ms. Terry, and Mr. Way participated in the webinar and that they gave the group unique perspectives on veterans' issues.

- g. Update on Joint Activities Calendar: Mr. Spain stated that the next Veterans Day planning meeting will be held on Tuesday, 09 June. Mr. Berlett noted that the Maryland State Convention will be held at Ocean City on 19 September at the War Memorial from 0900 to 1500 hours. Election for officers will take place on this date.
- h. Update on MHFA Proposal to the FMA Foundation Board: Mr. Way stated that The VA Way is still on schedule to roll out their mental health first aid training and are on track to begin training on Fort Meade next year. He expects that the virtual platform will be ready by the middle of the month and that The VA Way will begin teaching mental health first aid starting in July.

Mr. Jolissaint asked Mr. Way if he had any information on the Johns Hopkins psychological first aid program. Mr. Way stated that he signed up for the program. He noted that the program is similar to the mental health first aid program The VA Way offers but has a different approach.

Mr. Jolissaint asked if the Johns Hopkins program was specifically for mental health professionals or the general public. Mr. Way stated that he thought it could be for anyone, but it was probably for Johns Hopkins staff.

Mr. Way stated that The VA Way will be adding mental wellness and crisis navigation components to their program.

5. New Business

- a. Update on the American Legion "Buddy Check" Program: Mr. Berlett stated that A.L. Post 300 was about 70% through their call list. Mr. Spain stated that A.L. Post 156 had completed their list. Mr. Spain stated that Post 156 was also making restaurant deliveries to veterans.

Mr. Jolissaint noted that where he worked, the number of people seeking mental health therapy was back to normal and that he expected to see a spike in the numbers of people needing help as restrictions due to the pandemic begin to relax.



- b. Update on the HoCo School Level “Buddy” Program: Ms. Terry stated she was working to pilot a program at Longfellow Elementary School. Although the pandemic has put a hold on the program, she has started working unofficially with the family liaison to place students with families.
- c. New Business from Commission Members:
 - i. Mr. Bolen and Ms. Terry met with Mr. Brian Smith, blogger for “Free State Veterans,” to discuss veteran-related, Maryland State legislative initiatives. Mr. Bolen and Ms. Terry plan to work with Mr. Smith to track legislation of interest to Maryland veterans and the Commission. (Please see attachment B.)

6. Upcoming Events of Importance

- a. On 9 June, the Howard County Library System will be hosting a meet-n-greet with two New York Times best-selling authors, Mr. Elliott Ackerman and Mr. Phil Kay, starting at 1900 hours.
- b. Mr. Jolissaint stated that it is likely that public events for 4th of July celebrations will be canceled this year. Ms. Terry stated that the fireworks in Columbia had been canceled.
- c. Mr. Jolissaint stated that Howard County Fair activities are TBD.

7. Additional Items for Discussion

- a. Mr. Jolissaint noted that this was the first time he and Mr. Griggs have been at the same meeting and welcomed him to the Commission. Mr. Griggs stated that he is a USN veteran and is one of the VA representatives at Howard Community College (HCC).
- b. Mr. Jolissaint noted the herculean effort by Ms. Terry and Ms. Wanda Riddle (former Commissioner, HCCVMF), and everyone else who participated, to celebrate the 100th birthday of a Howard County WWII veteran last May. Mr. Jolissaint thanked them for their effort.
- c. Mr. Jolissaint thanked Mr. Rivers and Ms. Terry for their extraordinary effort to help a veteran in need to move back into his home after having a partial amputation last month.



- d. Mr. Jolissaint thanked the Maryland State Congressional Representatives and Senators for helping to extend the mobilization of the Maryland National Guard, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, past 90 days so that Guard personnel could get their benefits.
- e. Ms. Griffin asked if the Veterans Day Parade could be a “vehicle” parade. Mr. Jolissaint stated that the parade consists of both vehicle and pedestrian participants.
- f. Ms. Kesler reminded everyone to continue physical distancing and wearing face coverings. Ms. Kesler suggested that the Commission take an active role in connecting veterans to County programs regarding COVID-19 support.
- g. Mr. McGuire asked if there were any organizations in need of face coverings. Ms. Terry stated that the Howard County Office of Emergency Management is the point of contact for collecting donated PPE. Ms. Kesler stated that Community Organizing Against Disaster (COAD) is also accepting and distributing PPE donations. Mr. Jolissaint noted that there are still assisted living facilities and nursing homes that need PPE.

- h. Ms. Terry stated she would be available to answer questions about the County reopening plans.

- a) Mr. Jolissaint asked for a discussion on setting a date for the next Commission meeting. Discussion was held on holding a meeting on 2 July and/or 6 August. After discussion, the Commission decided not to hold a meeting on 2 July and to meet again on 6 August. Mr. Jolissaint called for a motion to hold the next meeting on 6 August. A motion and second to the motion were made. The motion was passed by unanimous voice vote.
- b) Mr. Jolissaint announced that the next meeting of the Howard County Commission on Veterans and Military Families will be held on Thursday, 06 August 2020, starting at 1900 hours. The meeting will be virtual.

ADJOURNMENT:



2000 hrs Mr. Jolissaint closed the meeting and directed the Commission to stand in adjournment until 1900 hours on 06 August 2020.



VAMHCS VSO & CS Stakeholders Meeting
20 May 2020

1105 hrs Dr. Adam M. Robison, Director VAMHCS, presiding, brought the meeting to order.

VAMHCS Updates

- 1) Dr. Robinson stated that the VAMHCS will continue to hold virtual meetings to protect the participants during the COVID-19 pandemic.
- 2) Dr. Robinson stated that the VAMHCS is dedicated to the safety of our veterans and giving them the highest quality of care. Clinics will reopen as soon as it is safe and appropriate to do so. He gave no timeline for reopening.
- 3) Dr. Robinson asked that veterans follow the VAMHCS on social media, and to keep their mailing addresses up-to-date so that they can continue to receive important information regarding VAMHCS openings and services.
- 4) Dr. Robinson stated the Secretary of the Department of Veterans Affairs, the Honorable Robert Wilkie, visited the VAMHCS clinic in Baltimore on Monday, 18 May. Mr. Wilkie toured the inpatient clinic and met with the frontline staff. (See photos of his visit below.)
- 5) Dr. Robinson informed us that on 18 May, the Department of Veterans Affairs started airing commercials on Baltimore-area television outlets with the message, "Thank you VA Frontline Heroes." (View the commercials here: [WBAL](#), [WBFE](#), [WJZ](#), and [WMAR](#).)



VAMHCS COVID-19 Update

- 3) The VAMHCS facility in Baltimore has set up a COVID-19 screening process at the entrance to the lobby of the building and in the garage; also, at the Loch Raven and Perry Point locations.
- 4) A rapid screening test will take place for patients with emergency or critical care needs, such as same-day surgery, cystoscopy, interventional radiology, or for pulmonary or cardiology-interventional testing. Additionally, any veteran coming in for treatment for radiation therapy or radiation oncology will be tested prior to starting their session.
- 5) The city of Baltimore has opened up hotels for people who are COVID-19 positive. The VAMHCS is working with the city to ensure veterans housed in the hotels are getting the care they need.
- 6) The clinic has contacted all of their contract nursing homes and has offered any veteran who wants to be transferred to the VA veterans' homes to be transferred. Three individuals have been identified to be transferred.
- 7) As the state begins to open, Dr. Marshall urges everyone to continue to practice safe social hygiene by washing their hands, wearing face coverings, and keeping a safe physical distance.

Data suggests that 20% of the general population in the New York area have been infected with the COVID-19 virus. In contrast, only about 10% of the healthcare professionals who have been wearing personal protective equipment (PPE) have been infected. She stated that the data clearly shows that wearing PPE works. She also urged everyone to stay home as much as possible and limit the number of trips that they make outside their house.

- 8) Dr. Marshall stated that pharmacists will be allowed to order COVID-19 tests and collect samples.
- 9) Dr. Marshall stated that Maryland will open new drive-thru sites in Prince George's County (at the health department in Cheverly) and at FedEx Field in Landover. Additionally, appointment-free, drive-thru testing will open at the Timonium fairgrounds, at the Glen Bernie VEIP, in Hyattsville, and in Clinton.
- 10) Dr. Marshall stated that the VAMHCS post-COVID-19 environment will most likely include more tele-services, and visitors to clinics will see more physical spacing in waiting rooms and staff in PPE.
- 11) **Dr. Robison stressed that the clinic's Emergency Department (ED) is open** and that veterans should not be afraid to come in if they have an emergency healthcare need. The ED is taking all precautions necessary to protect them from the virus.



VBA Update

- 16) VA facilities are closed to the public, but the VA continues to work in a telework environment.

National Cemetery Administration (NCA) Update

- 18) Memorial Day public events have been canceled at all national cemeteries. This includes the "flag-in" events and all public activities previously scheduled. There will be a private wreath-laying ceremony at the cemeteries that will be shared via live-stream on the NCA Facebook page.
- 19) NCA asks people planning to visit a national cemetery this Memorial Day weekend to consider visiting on Saturday or Sunday to avoid large crowds showing up on Monday.

Additional Announcements:

- 18) Maryland state cemeteries are open to the public from 1300 - 1645 hours on Monday - Friday, 0800 - 1645 hours on Saturday and Sunday, and from 0800 - 1645 hours on Memorial Day. All public ceremonies and events have been canceled for Memorial Day. Taps will be played during a private ceremony at 1330 hours on Memorial Day at the Crownsville cemetery.
- 19) All Maryland Department of Veterans Affairs (MDVA) offices are still operating. Anyone that needs to do business with one of their offices should contact that office before coming in to get more information on visitations.
- 20) The MDVA is launching a virtual remembrance wall on its website for families to remember their fallen loved ones.
- 21) Gold Star Moms are making masks for veterans. On 8 May, during Nurse Appreciation Week, they donated and delivered Mission BBQ to the healthcare workers at the clinic to show their appreciation to those frontline workers.

Next meeting: 17 June, 1100 hours, via Virtual Meeting.



Maryland General Assembly 2020

Veterans Legislative Accomplishments



Free State Veterans

An Independent Voice for Maryland Veterans and their Families



HB 12 (Rogers) | SB 341 (Griffith) – “Homes for Veterans of the Uniformed Services” – Updates existing language to ensure that a member of any of the eight uniformed services is eligible for a Home for Veterans supervised by the Department of Veterans Affairs. This basically changes “armed forces” to “uniformed services.”

HB 133 (Dept. of Trans.) – Vehicle Emissions Inspection Program Exemption for Deployed Military Personnel – Exempts active duty, deployed Service members from mandatory vehicle emissions inspections.

HB 236 (Carey) – “Hunting and Fishing Licenses for Active Military, Former Prisoners of War, Recipients of the Purple Heart Award, and Disabled Veterans” – Reauthorizes the issuance of complimentary or discounted hunting and fishing licenses to certain military personnel, former prisoners of war, recipients of the Purple Heart Award, and disabled veterans.

HB 257 (Crosby) | SB 417 (Salling) – Property Tax Credit for Disabled Veterans – Provides for a partial, sliding scale, county-optional property tax credit for service-disabled Veterans rated with a 50-99% disability.

- Federal AGI CAP of \$100K



- 25% of tax imposed if Veteran rated at least 50%, but no more than 74%
- 50% of tax imposed if Veteran rated at least 75%, but more than 99%

HB 349 | SB 280 (Admin.) – Occupational and Professional Licensing – Service Members, Veterans, and Military Spouses – Streamlines the occupational and professional licensing procedures for Service members, Veterans, and military spouses.

HB 362 | SB 282 (Admin) – Maryland National Guard – Tuition Assistance Program – Expands tuition assistance for Maryland National Guard members from 50% to 100%.

HB 503 (Valentino-Smith) | SB 391 (Peters) - Primary and Secondary Schools - Dependent Children of Service Members - Enrollment and Documentation Requirements – Requires County School Superintendents to allow a dependent child of a Service member who is relocating to the state on military orders and is not domiciled in that county during the enrollment period to apply for enrollment in a public school in the same manner and the same time as individuals domiciled in the county.

HB 506 (Valentino-Smith) | SB 458 (Elfreth) – Higher Education – Nonresident Tuition Exemption for Military Personnel, Spouses, and Dependents – Exempts spouses and financially dependent children of active duty members of the United States armed forces from paying nonresident tuition at a public institution of higher education in the State, in the event of transfer of the Service member between the time the spouse or family member is accepted and enrolled.

HB 596 (P. Young) – Veterans of the Afghanistan and Iraq Conflicts Scholarship – allows initial scholarships under the Veterans of the Afghanistan and Iraq Conflicts Scholarship to continue to be awarded for another 10 years (until June 30, 2030); thereafter, existing scholarships may be renewed.

HB 646 (P. Young) – Vehicle Registration – Special Plates for Veterans – Requires the MVA to charge an additional fee (\$10) for special registration plates for recipients of an individually earned, combat-related armed forces medals for each issuance of new registration plates; requires that the additional fee be credited to the Maryland Veterans Trust Fund.

HB 766 (Kaiser) | SB 700 (Waldstreicher) – Property Tax Credit – Disabled Military Personnel and Surviving Spouses – Expands the partial (20%), temporary (5 years), county-optional property tax exemption, currently available to uniformed services retirees and their surviving spouses, upon reaching 65 years of age to include a new eligibility category:

- This new category includes any active duty, honorably discharged, or retired uniformed services member who has a service-connected disability, regardless of age. This would also apply to their surviving spouse.



- Note: The specific governing body may establish criteria that define a service-connected disability

SB 142 (Simonaire) – Healing Hunting & Fishing Fund – Requires the Department of Natural Resources to establish a process for individuals purchasing certain online licenses and stamps to make a voluntary monetary donation to the Healing Hunting and Fishing Fund.

- Administered by the Chesapeake Bay Trust
- Provides grants to nonprofit organizations that support activities for Gold Star family members, disabled Veterans, disabled members of the Armed Forces, or permanently disabled persons requiring the use of a wheelchair
- Activities include recreational hunting and fishing, recreational water activities, other recreational outdoor activities, therapeutic outdoor activities, or workforce training for green jobs including outdoor agricultural jobs!

SB 294 (Ellis) – Veterans Education Protection Act – Protects Service members using GI Bill education benefits from predatory practices of for-profit schools. Ensures that in applying the for-profit schools 90 | 10 funding rule, GI Bill benefits paid to the school will be included as federally sourced funding.

- Maryland became first state in the Nation to enact this protection.

SB 1010 (Peters) – Maryland Code of Military Justice - Establishes a Maryland Code of Military Justice, which applies to all members of the State military forces at all times. It also repeals Subtitle 8 of the Public Safety Article (Courts-Martial). Basically, this law aligns the state code with the federal Uniform Code of Military Justice.
