where WE WERE

The Ellicott City Watershed Master Plan process officially kicked off on May 31, 2017, with the goal of developing a comprehensive, community-driven vision for rebuilding a stronger and more resilient Ellicott City. **Triggered by the devastating July 30, 2016, flood, the master plan effort was designed to take a fresh and creative look at potential long-term flood solutions and rebuilding strategies.**

In conjunction with Howard County and many interested stakeholders, by May of 2018, the master plan consulting team had developed a vision for a model, resilient community that thrives by protecting its people, commerce, history, culture, and natural environment. The consultants developed concepts and ideas for flood alleviation, resilient urban design, and comprehensive long-term rebuilding.

Following the May 2018 flood, the master plan process was paused and the previous five-year plan for flood mitigation developed. Master plan concepts were then developed in response. However, the master plan was again paused following the 2018 election to allow for the new administration to take office.

The above illustrations are for reference and represent ideas developed during the master planning process between May 2017 and October 2018. As the master plan process restarts in June 2019, and once a preferred Safe and Sound flood mitigation option is selected, the planning team will prepare updated ideas for community input. Some of the above representations will remain relevant, some may potentially require updates, and others will require updates and revisions.
